CRAFTS COUNCIL APPOINT FOUR NEW TRUSTEES TO BOARD

The Crafts Council, the national charity for craft, welcome four exceptional new trustees to the board.

Anant Sharma, Ian Jindal, Melanie Eddy and Yasmin Jones-Henry have all joined the board since March 2023, bringing the number of trustees to 11. The board has been co-chaired by Andy Marshall and Helen Hyde since October 2022.

Anant Sharma has spent the last 14 years leading Matter of Form — a Brand & Experience Design Consultancy partnering with timeless luxury brands, from Accor and Zaha Hadid Architects to Belmond, Diageo and Aman. A futurist, innovation enthusiast and keen advocate of developing meritocratic cultures that promote ideas and learning, Anant is also a dedicated teacher and student of behavioural design; exploring what drives us to do the things we do.

It's a fascination he brings to all ventures; including co-ownership of design thinking school Experience Haus, lecturing as an adjunct professor in branding, CX and innovation at EHL, the world's leading hospitality university, public speaking engagements from Walpole to Inhorgenta and Matter Of Form's own podcast What The Luxe — designed to elbow traditional notions of luxury, instead reframing timelessness as the relentless pursuit of craft.

lan Jindal is a consultant, researcher and advisor in eCommerce and multichannel retail performance.

He founded InternetRetailing.net and RetailX.net to serve Europe's multichannel retailers with research, insight and analysis, including the Top500 performance rankings. lan's advisory clients have included Fiorucci, Selfridges, House of Fraser, Marks & Spencer, John Lewis, Waitrose, De Bijenkorf, Kering and Walgreens Boots Alliance. Ian was Group eCommerce Director at Littlewoods Shop Direct, and Head of Online Operations at the BBC. Ian founded the European eCommerce Forum and authored the UK's first MSc in Internet Retailing. Ian was General Director of The Photographers' Gallery and Treasurer of Engage.org.

Melanie Eddy joins as a maker trustee. Melanie is a renowned sculptural jeweller, with pieces held in public and private collections, such as at the Victoria & Albert Museum, The Goldsmiths' Company Collection, and the Spencer Museum of Art. Melanie is a Director of The Association for Contemporary Jewellery, a Trustee for The Silversmiths & Jewellers Charity and serves in an advisory capacity for a number of industry organisations both in the UK and abroad, working extensively for Turquoise Mountain's Institute for Afghan Arts and Architecture in Kabul, Afghanistan, and then through India, Pakistan Afghanistan and Thailand.



She is currently involved in several initiatives looking at supporting diversity within the jewellery trade and is one of the founders of The Jewellery Futures Fund, an initiative looking to effect change through a programme of scholarships, programme grants, paid internships, and wider industry engagement.

Melanie is an Associate Lecturer on the MA Design: Ceramics Furniture and Jewellery programme at Central Saint Martins College of Art and Design and at the University for the Creative Arts and a visiting lecturer at West Dean College of Arts and Conservation.

Yasmin Jones-Henry is an FT writer and co-founder and curator of The Lab E20, a new flagship for experiential retail, cultural exhibition and creative workspace, with a focus on positive fashion and sustainable living. She works in the space where fashion meets finance and culture meets commerce. Through her work as a writer with specialisms in sustainability (ESG), design and investment, she has established a career championing the role culture and creative enterprise can play as a catalyst to inclusive regeneration. As cultural placemaking strategist Yasmin is a thought leader and an advocate for rethinking retail, scaling circular economy design principles and working to diversify the talent pipelines across the fashion industry and the built environment.
