Karen Downing's porcelain is found in many private collections and has been widely exhibited in the UK, as well as in Europe, Japan and the USA.

Karen received a Setting Up Grant from the Crafts Council in 1995, was awarded Arts Council Grants in 2003 and 2006, was selected for the Crafts Council's Index of Selected Makers in 1999 and has been a member of the Craft Potters Association since 1995. She currently lives and works in Norfolk.
